REGULAR MEETING

Board Action: Trustee Felder moved the approval to open the Regular meeting. Deputy Mayor Roz seconded the motion. All in favor.

Mayor Nahmias called the Regular Meeting to order at 8:00 p.m.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

December 5, 2024

Public Hearing #1 regarding the proposed Local Law #4 of 2024 to amend the Village Ordinance 200-62 (A) and (B) extending the parking meter hours of operation from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. and including Sundays for all metered areas

Board Action: Trustee Felder moved to open the Public Hearing regarding the proposed Local Law #4 of 2024 to amend the Village Ordinance 200-62 (A) and (B) extending the parking meter hours of operation from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. and including Sundays for all metered areas; attached hereto as Exhibit "A". Deputy Mayor Roz seconded the motion. All in favor.

Board Action: After hearing no further comments, Trustee Felder moved to close the Public Hearing regarding the proposed Local Law #4 of 2024 to amend the Village Ordinance 200-62 (A) and (B) extending the parking meter hours of operation from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. and including Sundays for all metered areas; attached hereto as Exhibit "A". Trustee Gottesman seconded the motion. All in favor.

Board Action: Deputy Mayor Roz moved to adopt/approve the proposed Local Law #4 of 2024 to amend the Village Ordinance 200-62 (A) and (B) extending the parking meter hours of operation from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. and including Sundays for all metered areas; attached hereto as Exhibit "A". Trustee Felder seconded the motion. All in favor. The Local Law #4 of 2024 passed and is adopted.

Public Hearing #2 regarding the proposed Local Law of 2024 to amend the Village Code regarding Zoning Code §70-11 regarding permits and grade deviations

Board Action: This item was tabled/adjourned until the next BOT meeting, on January 9, 2025.

Public Hearing #3 regarding the proposed Local Law of 2024 to amend the Village Code for Zoning

Board Action: This item was tabled/adjourned until the next BOT meeting, on January 9, 2025.

Mayor Nahmias recognized a great leader in the Village of Lawrence, who has passed away, Rabbi Yehoshua Kalish, and held a moment of Silence; to honor his blessed memory and praise what he's done for our community.

Mayor Nahmias asked that those present take another moment of Silence, to honor a fallen hero, Omer Neutra, a resident of Nassau County; to honor his blessed memory.

Mayor Nahmias added that we also pray for the return of all of our hostages in Israel; and to be surprised that we should have a lot of survivors.

With that said, Mayor Nahmias stated that the Village of Lawrence has issued Three (3) Proclamations:

- 1) One in honor of Rabbi Kalish's service and dedication to the community, and for being a great leader; and.
- 2) One in honor of Omer Neutra for his service to the Nassau County community, and for everything that he's done; and
- 3) We would also like to congratulate Michael & Mimi Fragin on being honored at Achiezer, for giving of themselves to better the community; and we've issued them a Proclamation recognizing their contribution and honoring them as well.

Deputy Mayor Roz added that we need to acknowledge Mayor Nahmias and his wife, Monica, as well. They were the Honorees at the Ohel Annual Gala for their wonderful support, generous donation and all that they do for the community and the Ohel Organization. She said that she would issue a Proclamation for them as well. She added: "We thank you for your service and everything that you've done for our community and for Ohel Organization". There was a round of applause. Mayor Nahmias thanked Deputy Mayor Roz.

Mayor Nahmias stated that Trustee Gottesman would give an update on the Village's fiscal performance after taking office with the Mayor and Trustee Felder, "which is very important to note". Trustee Gottesman went on to say: "When we came in, one of the first things we saw was that the Village was running at about a \$1.5 million deficit, which was a little alarming; and we took on the task to try to stop the bleeding. With a lot of hard work, we did better than that. Not only did we stop the bleeding, but our year-over-year revenues are up nearly 5%. We can contribute that to increased enforcement and other fees that we've been collecting. But the big news is expenses are down 16%, or \$590,000.00; and that's just a really being more efficient, reviewing contracts and paying attention to the details, and being fiscally responsible. I think the Mayor has a big hand in that. All those forty (40) hour weeks are paying off. Thank you, Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Nahmias thanked Trustee Gottesman and went on to say: "Not only that, we have no deficit now. We are actually positive for the first six months, which is a very important accomplishment and I think that we're going to continue to do well for the residents of Lawrence, with a lot of different projects that are coming up and a lot of different partnerships between the County and the State, that are going to be announced shortly".

Deputy Mayor Roz thanked Village Treasurer Lina Fusco for being an excellent Treasurer, and putting all of our reports together, always; and being so on top of all the numbers. The Mayor and Board concurred and thanked Ms. Fusco. Deputy Mayor Roz added "we couldn't do it without you". There was a round of applause.

GOOD & WELFARE

- 1) Deputy Mayor Roz raised the issue of possible memberships at the LY&CC for Board members who serve for two (2) years (a full term), who serve tirelessly and receive no compensation. Discussion ensued in this regard.
- 2) Trustee Felder thanked all of the Trustees and the Mayor for the installation of three (3) new (additional) Harborview South street signs (at the intersections) that will read "Rabbi Yehoshua Kalish Way", in honor of the immense work that Rabbi Kalish has done and the effect he's had on the community. His synagogue of almost thirty (30) years is on Harborview South, as well as the residence that he and his family have lived in, for the same amount of time. So, thank you all. In addition, when the new signs are being added, there will be a ceremony inviting his family, friends and congregation to honor and celebrate him.
- 3) Auxiliary Police Officer Jon Isler noted that in reference to Trustee Gottesman's financial update that there was increased enforcement; there are more tickets being issued and the Court is busier than ever, as enforcement has been vigilant. Discussion ensued in this regard.

Item #9 – Approve minimum residency and attendance requirements for all Board members

Board Action: Trustee Felder moved to approve the minimum residency (must be actual residents of the Village of Lawrence) and attendance requirements (75% of the meetings), for all Board members. (It was noted that all decisions and enforcement will be at the discretion of the Board.) Trustee Parnes seconded the motion. All in favor.

Item #10 – Approve hiring of additional part-time parking meter attendants as required

Board Action: Deputy Mayor Roz moved to approve the hiring of additional parttime parking meter attendants as required. Trustee Felder seconded the motion. All in favor.

Item #11 – Authorize the Mayor to execute settlement of the Goldstein lawsuit

Board Action: Trustee Parnes moved the approval to authorize the Mayor to execute a settlement of the Goldstein lawsuit. Trustee Felder seconded the motion. All in favor.

Mayor Nahmias stated that when he and Trustees Felder and Gottesman set out to run for office, as a group, their intention was to take the Village of Lawrence away from litigation. So, this is one of the first steps that we're taking "to stop the bleeding", for the Village of Lawrence. We need to be community oriented and not in litigation.

INCORPORATED VILLAGE OF LAWRENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Proposed Local Law No. 4 of 2024

§ 200-62. Schedule XXIII: Parking Meters. [Amended 11-18-2013 by L.L. No. 1-2013] Establishment of parking meter areas; general regulations. The following parking meter areas are hereby established, in which the parking fees and hours of operation applicable to parking therein shall be as herein set forth:

- A. Parking meters for which the fee shall be \$0.25 for each half hour or part thereof, and shall be in operation from 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. daily, except for federal holidays:
 - (1) The north and south sides of Central Avenue between Washington Avenue and Rockaway Turnpike.
 - (2) The east and west sides of Frost Lane, north of Parking Lot No. 3.
- B. Parking meters for which the fee shall be \$0.25 for each hour or part thereof, and shall be in operation between 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. daily, except federal holidays:
 - (1) The north and south sides of Central Avenue between Rockaway Turnpike and Lawrence Avenue.
 - (2) The east and west sides of Herrick Drive between Central Avenue and the Long Island Railroad tracks.
- C. Parking meters which shall be in operation between 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. daily, except for federal holidays:
 - (1) Parking meters designated as \$0.25 for each half hour or part thereof located in Parking Lot Nos. 3 and 4.
 - (2) Parking meters for which the fee shall be \$0.25 for each hour or part thereof, located in Parking Lot Nos. 3 and 4.
 - (3) Parking meters for which the fee shall be \$0.25 for each hour or part thereof, located on the east side of Frost Lane, south of Parking Lot No. 3.
- D. Overnight parking.
 - (1) Parking permits may be issued for the purpose of allowing overnight parking without the use of the meters between the hours of 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 a.m. the following day,

and all-day Saturday, at:

- (a) At the long-term meters located in Parking Lots No. 3 and No. 4;
- (b) At the long-term meters located on Central Avenue between Rockaway Turnpike and Lawrence Avenue; and
- (c) The long-term meters on Herrick Drive between Central Avenue and the Long Island Railroad tracks.
- (2) The permit will be issued in accordance with Chapter 125, Licenses and Permits, of the Code of the Village of Lawrence.
- (3) Every permit shall show the year in which it is issued. The permit shall be affixed to the rear window of the vehicle for which it is issued.
